Introduction:

- Written by Paul around 57 AD possibly from Corinth on his third missionary journey.
- Rome was the capital city of the Roman empire and had a population of About 1,000,000 people. As the capital, Rome was considered a very spectacular city.
- It may have been some captive slaves of Jewish heritage initially brought the gospel to Rome, as well as some Jews who were present at Pentecost (Acts 2). Greeks would have then heard and obeyed.
- The church at Rome had been there many years and had a reputation among the early world. (Romans 1:8; 15:23-24)
- This was a very practical epistle for those in New Testament times, and remains very practical for is today.
